SUBJECT: SECOND QUARTER SUSPENSION/WEAPONS/EXPULSION
REPORT: 2004-2005

PERTINENT FACTS:

Information regarding suspensions and expulsions for various offenses, including weapons, is collected from the elementary, middle, and high schools each quarter. The information is shown in the narrative information below and in Attachments A-F.

Second Quarter Suspensions

Total second quarter suspensions for the 2004-2005 school year increased slightly in the elementary schools (from 191 last year to 211 this year). However, there were significant decreases in middle schools (from 733 last year to 542 this year) and high schools (816 last year to 765 this year).

The most notable increase in elementary suspensions was in fighting (61 last year to 84 this year). There were no firearm incidents in the elementary schools during second quarter. Middle schools showed decreases in all but two categories. Assault increased from 10 last year to 11 this year and drug/alcohol incidents increased from 20 last year to 32 this year. Suspensions at the high school level showed increases for fighting/threats (87 to 100), assault (20 to 22), harassment (8 to 18), and sexual harassment (5 to 14). There were three firearm incidents this year compared to one last year, but there was one less weapons (not firearms) incident this year. Drug/alcohol suspensions were down from 80 to 67.

Second Quarter Expulsions

Six middle school students and 42 high school students were expelled by the School Board during the second quarter of the 2004-2005 school year. No elementary students were expelled during this time. The 48 students expelled during second quarter this year compare with 52 students expelled during the

same period last year. Action by the School Board is pending for nine high school students who are accused of violations during the second quarter.

Discipline Reports

The elementary, middle, and high school discipline summaries follow. These show elementary schools second quarter by school and category (Attachments A & B), middle schools second quarter by school and category (Attachments C & D), and high schools second quarter by school and category (Attachments E & F).

In Discipline Reports (attachments B, D and F), "other" is the final category choice for recording offenses. At times, this descriptor has been used when a more definitive category would have been preferred. Instructional division leaders have committed to working with schools to restrict the use of the "other" category to times when none of the 13-19 specific labels are suitable.

The second use of an "other" category has been in the quarterly suspension and expulsion memorandum where highlighted offenses that are tracked over a three-year period do not explain a significant portion of the suspension statistics. In this memorandum and successive reports, this category titled "other" will be followed by narrative summarizing these pertinent suspension areas.

Elementary Schools

The suspension report for the second quarter of the 2004-2005 school year is included for your information. Suspensions involving weapons and drugs and alcohol, as well as suspensions that deal with fighting/assault, sexual harassment and or harassment/bullying are compared in this narrative for the 2003-2004 and 2004-2005 school years. There were no expulsions or findings of causality for the second quarter of the 2004-2005 school year.

As compared to the 2003-2004 school year, elementary suspensions increased during the second quarter of 2004-2005. There were 191 recorded suspensions in 2003-2004 and 211 in 2004-2005. There were six weapons violations (four small knives and two cap guns) that resulted in suspension during the second quarter of 2004-2005; there were four reported weapons incidents during the second quarter of 2003-2004.

There were two drug and alcohol suspensions for the second quarter compared to three during the second quarter last year. There have been five sexual harassment suspensions this year compared to three last year. The largest areas of increase were seen in fighting, which increased by 23 suspensions, and reckless behavior, which increased by six. Compared to last year, assault increased by one suspension, while threats remained the same at five.

Eight elementary schools had zero suspensions in the second quarter of both 2003-2004 and 2004-2005, while 14 schools had one to three suspensions. Six schools one or two more suspensions this year than second quarter of last year. Twenty-two schools increased suspensions by three or more. Eighteen schools had a decrease in the number of suspensions compared to the second quarter of last year, while at 14 schools, the number of suspensions remained the same.

Middle School

The suspension rate for the second quarter of the 2004-2005 school year for grade six, (Mirror Lake only), seven and eight was 542; a decrease of 191. There were 733 middle school suspensions during the same period in 2003-2004 and 797 in 2002-2003. Decreases occurred in the following categories: 79 in fighting/assault, 29 in harassment, and five in drug/alcohol. There was a decrease of 10 in suspensions for tobacco. Suspensions in the “other” category include 33 for profanity/obscenity, 32 for general disruptive behavior, and 29 for dangerous actions or materials, and behavior.

The decrease in middle school suspensions is attributed to the special efforts and hard work by staff members of each middle school, to integrate the Aggressors, Victims & Bystanders Program into their curriculum and school culture.

High Schools

The total number of high school suspensions for the second quarter of the 2004-2005 school year is 765.

During the second quarter of the 2004-2005 school year, there were 71 incidents of fighting as compared to 52 incidents during the 2003-2004 school year; an increase of 19 fighting incidents. There were 29 incidents of threats/instigating during the second quarter of the 2004-2005 school year and 35 incidents in the second quarter of 2003-2004. For the second quarter of the 2004-2005 school year, there were 55 suspensions for drugs, down 13 compared to 68 for the 2003-2004 school year. There were 12 alcohol suspensions for the second quarter of this year and 12 for the 2003-2004 school year. Harassment/bullying incidents were at 18 for the second quarter of this year, up by 10 compared to 8 incidents in the 2003-2004 school year.

Charter Schools

There were no suspensions or expulsions during the second quarter of 2004-2005 at Frontier or Family Partnership Charter Schools. Aquarian Charter School had two suspensions; one for one day (bullying), and one for 10 days (sexual harassment/assault). They had no expulsions. No data was reported from Highland Tech High Charter School. Based on District records, there were two second quarter expulsions at Highland Tech for possession of firearms. Both students were expelled for the presumptive one year.
