What is Alaska Measures of Progress?

Alaska Measures of Progress (AMP) is the new Alaska assessment for students in grades 3-10. It replaces the Standards Based Assessments (SBA). AMP is aligned to the State of Alaska English language arts and math standards which were adopted in 2012. Like the SBAs, students will take the AMP test to help determine their progress over the course of the year. The AMP assessment will take place in the spring of each school year and will have two subtests, English language arts and math. Although the assessment is not timed, each subtest will take most students between 90-150 minutes.

How is AMP administered?

AMP is a computer-based assessment, whereas SBAs were paper and pencil.

When do students take AMP?

Since students will be using technology to complete AMP, the spring testing schedule is different than in prior years. Students will test during a 5-week window with each grade testing during specific weeks.

Parents can use the schedule below to plan their family calendar. Within this testing window, principals will craft the schedule for their building. Parent questions about scheduling should be directed to their child's school principal.

There is a statewide testing window for the following grades:

Grades 3 and 7: March 30 to April 10
Grades 4 and 8: April 6 to April 17
Grades 5 and 9: April 13 to April 24
Grades 6 and 10: April 20 to May 1



Attendance during the testing dates is very important.

No More HSGQE! . . . Now What?

The High School Graduation Qualifying Exam was officially repealed by the Alaska Legislature in the last legislative session. With the repeal of the HSGQE and in accordance with House Bill 278 which was signed into law in May 2014, students who seek a diploma will be required to take the SAT, ACT or WorkKeys assessment (College and Career Readiness Assessments). The State of Alaska will incur the cost of one test administration per student. More details, including ASD test dates and locations, will be provided once further information from the Department of Education & Early Development is received. Students are NOT required to earn a specific score to graduate.

Alternate Assessment (AA)

The Alternate Assessment (AA) is used as way to measure achievement on an alternate set of state standards and is given to students in grades 3-10 with severe cognitive disabilities. The AA is given in the spring as part of the Standards Based Assessment used to meet Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) under No Child Left Behind (NCLB).

COMMUNITY AGENCY INFORMATION: The Center maintains a collection of informational brochures specific to local and statewide agencies. These agencies cover a range of topics such as early childhood, vocational information, high school graduation, disability assistance, etc. Also included are organizations that focus on special needs such as autism, down syndrome, traumatic brain injury, to name a few.

WEB RESOURCES: The STEP Center website provides access to comprehensive disability topics and resources. The site contains links to agencies and resources in the Anchorage area as well as national websites providing valuable information on disabilities.

LENDING LIBRARY: The library has books and media that cover a wide range of information on disabilities along with other topics of interest such as academics, classroom inclusion, social skills, parenting help, attention deficit, anxiety, autism, fetal alcohol spectrum disorders, mental health issues, behavior issues, social-emotional learning, life skills, transition, and much more. NONE for NINE: No Alcohol for Nine Months of Pregnancy Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Awareness Day Sept 9, 2014

Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) is an umbrella term that describes a number of permanent birth defects caused by alcohol consumption during pregnancy. Each year, FASD Awareness Day is celebrated internationally on Sept. 9, the ninth day of the ninth month to help spread the word that there is no safe amount of alcohol consumption during the nine months of pregnancy (None for Nine).

The Anchorage Council on FASD joined with folks from all over the globe by sponsoring an event to raise awareness of FASD on Sept. 9th. This event took place at the ASD Education Center from 5:30 to 8;30pm. There were over 25 informational booths by agencies and individuals working in the field of FASD. Some of the guest speakers included Senator Kevin Meyer, AK Dispatch News reporter Kyle Hopkins, FASD consultant for the Anchorage School District Deb Evensen, and speakers from the Governor's Council on Disabilities. Community members, families and professionals gathered together to show their support for continued efforts to stop prenatal alcohol consumption. 
