how can my child attend?

- At Government Hill Elementary, the program runs kindergarten through sixth grade. The entry level is from kindergarten through the first semester of first grade. When space is available, Spanish-speaking students may enter the program at any grade if they meet certain Spanish literacy criteria.
- Parent permission is required and enrollment is determined by the Anchorage School District lottery system. There are currently two lotteries a year held in March and August. For more information please visit: www.asdk12.org/choices/lottery.
- Once students are admitted into the program, there is no need to re-apply in the lottery each year.
 However, if a student exits the program, there is no guarantee that they will be readmitted at a later date.
- Students tend to achieve the most when families make a minimum seven year commitment to the program. This duration ensures full development of both English and Spanish literacy skills.

Program History

The Two-Way Spanish Immersion program began at Government Hill Elementary in 1993 and continues to be the only Two-Way (dual language) immersion program in Alaska. The program continues through Romig Middle School and West High School with a current K-12 enrollment of approximately 500 students each year.

What is Immersion?

Since the inception of French language immersion programs in Canada close to 50 years ago, countless research has been conducted showing the success and benefits of immersion education. Immersion differs from traditional instructional approaches in which second languages are taught as separate subjects, in isolation from core content. Immersion refers to learning core content through a second subject area content, but also become bilingual when doing so. The Government Hill two-way partial immersion program serves both language minority and language majority students together in the same classroom. Generally, 50 percent of the students are English speakers wanting to learn Spanish, and the other 50 percent are Spanish-speaking students, who want to maintain and further develop their first language while acquiring English language skills. At the elementary level, students of both language groups are immersed for half of their instructional day in Spanish and the other half in English, and for one or two class periods at the secondary level.

What are the goals of an Immersion Program?

- Developing a high level of proficiency in the target language
- Developing positive attitudes toward those who speak the target language and their culture(s)
- Developing English language skills commensurate with expectations for students' ages and abilities
- Gaining skills and knowledge in the content areas of the curriculum in keeping with stated objectives in these areas — Center for Applied Linguistics

To ensure student success, parental support is a key element. Because this is a K-12 program and involves the unique challenges of learning in two languages, it is critical that parents understand the program, support its goals, and make a long-term commitment to its philosophy.

Curriculum

Students in the Government Hill Spanish Immersion Program learn the same Anchorage School District adopted curriculum as students in the English-only programs.

At the elementary level students have two teachers: one for each language. They work as a team to integrate the required subjects: math, science, social studies, and English language arts. In addition, students also learn Spanish language arts. For example, the Spanish teacher may teach science, social studies, and Spanish language arts while the English partner teacher teaches English language arts and math. Subjects taught in one language are not repeated in the other language; however, teachers are able to complement what each other is teaching, showing connections and providing clarification when necessary.

At the middle school level (grades 7-8), students attend two classes daily: a Spanish language arts class and social studies. The curriculum is integrated and students learn social studies themes while reading Spanish literature and refining their writing and grammar skills. The content of the social studies classes mirrors that of traditional, non-immersion social studies content. At the high school level students attend one class per day.

What is the ASD Language Immersion Completion Cord?

Students who complete the immersion program in their senior year earn the ASD "Language Immersion Completion Cord" to wear at the West High School graduation ceremony

7th Grade Spanish Language

Students will increase and refine their communication skills in Spanish through conversation, vocabulary building, grammar, composition, and appropriate Spanish literature.

7th Grade World Geography

Students will learn the same content as the ASD seventh grade social studies program, which includes Alaska and world, physical and political geography, and people and their relationship to their environment.

8th Grade Spanish Language

Students will increase and refine their communication skills in Spanish through conversation, vocabulary building, grammar, composition, and appropriate Spanish literature.

8th Grade U.S. History

Students will learn the same content as the ASD eighth grade social studies program, which includes historiography and American history themes.

9th Grade Vistas Juveniles del Mundo Hispano

Students will compare and contrast aspects of Hispanic culture with their own through indepth study of themes such as families, ecology, immigration, heroes and leaders, and myths and legends.

10th Grade Perspectivas Literarias

Students will refine literacy and oral skills through new cultural perspectives using authentic texts and various genres. This is a preliminary course to AP Spanish Language or Advanced Placement coursework

11th or 12th Grade International Baccalaureate Higher Level Spanish and AP Spanish Language

Students develop their language skills in advanced composition and conversation in this beginning college level course. Students read, write, analyze, and synthesize information from authentic texts.

11th or 12th Grade Estudios Latinoamericanos

Students learn about contemporary and historical issues in Latin America while reinforcing and expanding their Spanish grammar, vocabulary, and fluency in this content-integrated course.
